THE LEGISLATIVE REPORT

Striped Bass

The Striped Bass meeting at the ASMFC week was not a long meeting. There was nothing accomplished since they are waiting for the stock assessment. Striped bass engenders strong feelings in everyone who fishes for them. Everyone has a strong opinion about the management of this species based on their own fishing habits. The catch and release anglers want big fish and many fish so they can enjoy catching and releasing large numbers of fish. Many of those anglers don't even eat fish but just enjoy the sport. The charter boat captains who cater to the catch and release fishermen support their ideas. There are the anglers who are the historical striped bass fishermen but occasionally want a striped bass for dinner. They may release a lot of fish but will take a few home to eat. There are also the new striped bass fishermen who have been pushed into fishing for striped bass. They used to fish for summer

flounder, weakfish, winter flounder or black sea bass and fish for food for dinner and for the winter. The regulations on these species have greatly reduced the opportunity to bring home these fish for dinner or storage. They have not focused their attention on striped bass as a food fish and want regulations that allow for significant catch. There are also recreational anglers who historically sold their fish and want to continue to do that to supplement their income or help pay for their fishing trips. Then there are the full-time commercial fishermen whose commercial practices depend on where they are located and whether they fish the oceans or bays. They have also been restricted as some states have determined that striped bass cannot be sold.

This article will deal with the recreational fishing sector. Trying to meet all the wants, needs and expectations of the diverse groups within the recreational anglers presents an ongoing challenge. I consider myself a member of all three groups; I like to fish for striped bass, I generally release striped bass and I enjoy an occasional striped bass for dinner. The only way to have enough striped bass to satisfy all of these needs is to create a sustainable fishery. That is where the problem lies. The catch and release anglers want an overabundance of striped bass with no harvest for anyone. They would like to see the stocks where they were just after the moratorium in the 90's. That fishery can only exist if no one wants to eat striped bass and that is an unrealistic expectation. As more anglers enter the fishery and start to consume striped bass, it becomes a more popular dinner. The stock can accommodate that if managed properly. That is what the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission has been balancing since the fishery opened in 1992. The Commissioners have been considering how to allow a harvest for commercial use, subsistence use and catch and release. The ASMFC does this by not aiming for an all-time high in the stocks but by creating a management plan that accommodates all the user groups.

When I go to ASMFC representing New Jersey, I need to weigh the balance of how the fishery is being managed coast-wide and try to accommodate all the user groups. This very seldom makes anybody happy. But that is part of my job. When it comes to the recreational sector, my votes and my comments reflect the needs of all the anglers, not a single group. As long as the stocks can accommodate a harvest for personal consumption, I will make sure that happens. When many of us got involved in managing striped bass in the 70's our goal was to bring the

stocks back to a level that was sustainable and create a viable fishery. Because of environmental factors, competition from other species and human abuse of the resource, we cannot support levels of harvest that we had in the past. As an example, fishermen from Maine have not seen striped bass in a few years. It had an economic impact on the recreational fishing industry that depended on striped bass. Maine is also a no-sale state. In response to their anglers, Maine's delegation has been supporting a cut-back in the recreational harvest. It was interesting to hear from this delegation the amount of striped bass caught in Maine waters in 2013. This was done without the implementation of restrictions that are unnecessary. I have a long memory. Beginning in 1996, there have been people at the table representing the catch and release anglers who believe we are harvesting too many fish. New Jersey, through legislation, had to change the regulations to accommodate the knee-jerk reactions due to this pressure. In a few years, we were required to return to the original regulations since the changes had been unnecessary.

Climate change will have a long-term impact on striped bass. We will need to deal with it but I am not discussing it in this article. Nothing that I have seen in the past 40 years and in the past 24 years, at ASMFC, has shown me that we need to change our current practice. If the science and the triggers show the need for a change, then I will support that season opens again. It's a win-win!

As many of know I also perform the Vessel Safety Checks for USCG Auxiliary. This is a no cost service and assists each boater to have the minimum safety equipment on board. If successfully qualifying, a decal gets place on your vessel. If you do not qualify, no fear, I does not get reported and we will discuss the items and I will come back and do it all again. The advantages to displaying a decal are that should you get stopped and boarded by the Coast Guard it allows them know that you take safety seriously and you may also get a discount on your boat insurance. COASTAL ANGLERS CLOSER TO CONGRESSIONAL ASSIST

Bipartisan Leadership Recognizes Need For Fisheries Reform

September 11, 2013 - U.S. saltwater anglers today heard from a bipartisan coalition of congressional leaders that our federal fisheries law is in need of amendments in order to keep Americans fishing.

In a House Committee on Natural Resources Oversight Hearing this morning on the "*The Reauthorization of the Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act*," Chairman Doc Hastings (R-WA) opened the testimony by noting the official findings of a [National Academies of Sciences report](#) which in part found "*the benefits and costs of introducing more flexibility in determining the time to rebuild should be considered*" by Congress.

"I believe the report tracks what we have been hearing both during Congressional hearings and at the Managing Our Nations Fisheries conference," Rep. Hastings said, adding "generally, the report correctly finds that while the 2006/2007 amendments were well intentioned, some modifications should be considered to give fishery managers additional flexibility to deal with the complexities of fisheries."

The Recreational Fishing Alliance (RFA) praised the Committee and its Chairman for holding this important hearing on the state of the coastal fishing industry, and said saltwater anglers should be optimistic about what transpired in Washington DC today.

"Both Chairman Hastings and new ranking minority leader Peter DeFazio (D-OR) pledged support for looking at sensible amendments to the Magnuson-Stevens Act to incorporate limited management flexibility to provide a

better balance of commerce and conservation," said RFA executive director Jim Donofrio. "The recreational fishing industry only works if our saltwater anglers are provided access to healthy and sustainable fisheries, and many of the witnesses today were really able to get that point across to the Committee."

Jeff Deem of Virginia, a representative on the Mid Atlantic Fisheries Management Council, [testified on behalf of the RFA](#) and spoke of his responsibilities to represent coastal fishermen while working to achieve a balance between conservation goals mandated by the Magnuson-Stevens Act.

"The premise that balance can be achieved between these two needs is reasonable and should be a defining principle of successful fisheries management," Deem told Congress, adding "yet, during my tenure on the Council, I have seen the implementation of some MSA mandates cause significant socioeconomic harm on the recreational fishing community while producing no conservation benefit."

"I believe it is critical that flexibility be part of the reauthorized MSA," Deem added.

When asked by Chairman Hastings, every witness except NOAA Fisheries and the Pew-funded Ocean Conservancy offered support for limited, strategically-targeted flexibility in the upcoming reauthorization of the Magnuson-Stevens Act.

"Seven years after Congress told NOAA to create a better recreational data collection program, based on the National Academies' recommendations, little has changed since 2006," Hastings said, adding "recreational fishermen doubt the data and managers continue to be forced to make decisions without adequate or real-time data."

In a March 13, 2013 hearing before the same Committee, NMFS' Deputy Assistant Administrator for Regulatory Programs Sam Rauch revealed that legal requirements to incorporate new data collection methods in a time-certain deadline had not been made, stating "It is correct that we have a 2009 deadline that we did not entirely meet." At the September 11th hearing, Rauch told Hastings and fellow Committee members that "the data collection is a budget issue."

At the conclusion of the hearing, Chairman Hastings went on to thank the witnesses, while also pledging to spearhead

incorporation of sensible amendments to the Magnuson-Stevens Act to represent the views of stakeholders and fisheries representatives who have appeared before the Committee since 2007.

Up for a Challenge? Try an IGFA Slam

They aren't [targeting](#) the biggest fish. Nor are they weekend anglers, content to catch whatever is in season at their local spot. Fishermen on a slam quest are a



particular group, [investing](#) an extraordinary amount of time and research into capturing all the species on their list. Some cross continents in a mere 100 days to [complete](#) the challenge; others plot and plan over several years to achieve their goal. We caught up with a few slam masters and asked them: What's so alluring about completing a slam?

The Game

The fish are, of course, at the center of every slam adventure. There are six Royal Slam clubs – the billfish, salmon, tuna, shark, bass, and trout – each of which requires the angler to catch between six and nine IGFA-recognized species within the category. Catching eight [stripers](#) may seem like an easy enough task, but hooking eight different species of bass turns out to be more challenging than one might think. “I don’t think I even knew what a shoal bass was until we decided to take on the Bass Royal Slam,” shares Bo Nelson, an IGFA Representative from Arizona. He and Pete Binaski, an IGFA Representative from California, targeted their slams together and are two of only four people to have [completed](#) all three freshwater Royal Slams. “Each of the species is different, even though

they're all bass or trout or salmon. You have to think about each of them differently if you're going to be successful."

Even when the angler is familiar with the species, actually getting one on the line is an undertaking in itself. "It took my son Wes two years and four visits to Fort Lauderdale, Florida to catch his first swordfish," Mark Davis, of Malibu, California, tells us. Now working on his second Royal Slam, 12-year old Wesley recently hooked two more swordfish but lost them both. "Catching even one swordfish in your life is incredible," Mark says, now working on his fifth Royal Slam, "but keeping them on the line can be kind of hit and miss." Slam clubs also appeal to the conservationist in each of these anglers. Neither Grand nor Royal Slams require the fish to be weighed, allowing anglers to practice catch-and-release as often as possible. The vast majority of all the fish Bo, Pete, Mark, and Wes caught for their slams were released to be caught again another day.

Fishing report from Joe Filice Sept 3, 2013.



On Tues, Russ Denton called about fishing on Weds. I had painting to do on Weds, but guess where I was on Weds. We left the dock at 9:00, gassed up and headed to the Garden State Reef South. we started our first drift in 68' and taking waves at the aft. Russ's fishing partner, Dennis noticed we were riding low in the water and we realized the bilge was not running. After some scrambling, the float switch was fixed and

about 30 minutes later we were back in business.

I rigged up a 3-way swivel. Off the bottom was a 12" leader to a 6 oz Spro jig tipped with a 6" nuclear chicken Gulp. Off the top swivel was a 18" leader with a fly teaser tipped with squid. Oner the day I had my limit with a 24" & 25" on the Spro jig. Another 3 keepers came on the teaser, not as big though. I had approx 1 1/2 doz total fish. Russ and Dennis had 2 keepers each and approx. another 2 doz throwbacks. It was a terrific day on the water, but a sloppy ride back into a south wind

What's This KNOT?

A new column is being started with this month's issue entitled "What's This KNOT". Each month issue will highlight a fishing knot and how to tie

it. This month there are two items that shown. The first is the Bristol Knot.

The [bristol](#) knot (also called noname knot) is relatively simple to tie and results in a very [streamlined](#) connection between a [double line](#) and leader. The knot facilitates passing through guides and over rollers. Essentially a jam knot, the bristol is a highly effective knot for attaching super-braid (spectra) double line to your leader.

The second is [Estimating Monofilament Backing When Using Braided Spectra](#)



How much monofilament [backing](#) will i need beneath my [braided line](#) top-shot?

This is a nifty [mathematics](#) calculation on how to estimate how much monofilament backing you will need to use with [braided line](#) top-shots.

In this situation we are using a [Shimano Sustain](#) 5000 spool which holds 200 yards of 12 lb monofilament. and we want to use a 150 yard top-shot of 20 lb braided line.

How much monofilament backing do you need to fill the spool space?

In New Jersey, all persons operating any powerboat or PWC (jet ski, sea doo, etc.) must have proof of passing an approved boating safety education course. All operators, regardless of age, must possess an approved boating safety education certificate.

GET YOUR NEW JERSEY BOATER CARD IN 3 EASY STEPS

1. Take and pass the New Jersey Boat Operator Online Boating Safety Education Course and print your "Proof of Completion" document.
2. Call and schedule an appointment to take the final exam at any our approved testing centers.
3. Show your "Proof of Completion" document at the testing center along with a photo ID. The final exam must be taken in person and a passing score of 70% or better is required to obtain your New Jersey Education Certificate.
