August 13 - VHFC Club Meeting

AUGUST SPEAKER - Captain Brett Taylor - Capt. Brett is a licensed USCG captain who has been avidly fishing the Barnegat Bay and surrounding waters for the past 20+ years. He has become one of the most sought-after charter captains along the mid-Jersey coast, primarily because he really knows how to find and catch the fish. With two boats each equipped with trolling motors, he has moved Barnegat Bay fishing to a new level. If you are a regular reader of *The Fisherman* or *On The Water* magazines, you will know that Bret is an expert at communicating his top fishing practices to the recreational community. This year Capt. Brett will discuss his approaches to fishing the end of the summer flounder season. This is one talk that you don't want to miss!

NEW JERSEY FISHING REGULATIONS by Phil Simon - Normally, I do not target bluefish, except during a short period of time in the late spring, when they invade the Barnegat inlet and Barnegat Bay and proceed to terrorize any resident baitfish hanging around. My impression has been that for the last couple of years there have been fewer bluefish, and smaller bluefish in the inlet and bay than in past years, although this is not a scientific survey. When I applied to the Mid-Atlantic Marine Fishery Council this year to be selected to be on one of the advisory panels, the bluefish panel was not my first choice. Nevertheless, that's where I was chosen to sit, along with an unexpected second panel as well (Ecosystem and Ocean Planning). Thus, I had to scramble to educate myself on the bluefish fishery before my first panel meeting last week.

As a result of my reading and the discussion at the panel meeting, I learned several interesting things. First, contrary to my impressions, the bluefish fishing has been quite outstanding for the last two years, according to the charter, party boat, and commercial

boat captains on the panel. Some ascribe this to the reduced fishing for squid and menhaden, providing more food for the blues, which makes sense to me. Second, a substantial portion of the annual recreational harvest of bluefish is taken in Florida and North Carolina, more than I would ever have thought. When I think of southern recreational fishing, I think of redfish, tarpon, snook, and others, but not blues. Yet here are the numbers as reported by the Marine Recreational Information Program (MRIP):



¹ Average weight in Table 3 is simply the pounds harvested divided by the number of fish harvested. These a verage weights are calculated differently than what is presented in Table 2 due to the state and wave aspect associated with released fish.

These numbers seemed to me a little strange, especially the huge numbers of bluefish taken in Florida, so I contacted one of the Florida Department of Fish and Wildlife commission members to see what he thought. He basically said that he does not buy any of this data. I also contacted the Simonds brothers, who run the Salt Strong membership club out of Florida, and post a lot of UTube videos on Florida fishing. They were quite puzzled when I showed them the table. It seemed a bit out of line to them but more on MRIP in a minute. Third, while the recent drastic crackdown on recreational bluefish (remember when it was 15 fish, not 3) was triggered by the slippage of the spawning stock biomass (SSB) numbers below the ½ maximum sustainable yield target (SSBMSY). Well, it turns out that the slippage was small, and that the SSB has basically been

following a random walk along the target threshold for the last 30 years or so. And when you look at the graph, you realize that the threshold, and the so-called optimal stock size threshold, were determined using primarily numbers from the distant past. Here's the graph:



The solid line is the stock size, and the SSBMSY long dashed line is what they think the "normal" stock size should be, and what they are now required by law to bring up the stock (I.e. rebuilding) due to the stock falling below the SSB Threshold line - the short dashed line. In fact, there is now so much doubt about all of this that the Bluefish fishery numbers for SSBMSY and SSBThresh are going to be re-visited in depth next year by ASMFC and MAMFC. You will also note that bluefish recruitment (new fish brought into the stock) has been pretty steady as well.

So, despite the ever-drastic controls placed on this fishery, the stock size and recruitment have been basically unaffected. In my opinion, if the stock size is truly below normal, other factors other than fishing pressure are more responsible, a theme you may have heard from me before (think food, oxygen, habitat, and sex). Meanwhile, the rebuilding effort targets for 2022 have been proposed, and low and behold they are now estimating that they will be able to *increase* the harvest over the seven year rebuilding time frame, and still achieve their goal of increasing the stock size. To me, this means

that basically the regulators don't think much of their own threshold numbers, and that reality is starting to creep back in.

So some good news may be ahead for the bluefish numbers, but it appears the increased quotas will still bump up against the high estimates for recreational harvest as determined by MRIP. At least our quotas should not go down any further, which usually happens during a rebuilding program.

A lot of the grief we have been experiencing lately has been (partly) the result of the revised methods for the recreational harvest estimation, MRIP. They changed the survey from a random telephone survey to a more directed mail survey for estimating "fishing effort", as well as made some improvements to the angler intercept program that estimates catch per unit effort. The result was a "discovery" that the recreational harvest for all species, bluefish included, has been much larger than previously estimated, sometimes seven or eight-fold more. Of course, the commercial side was thrilled to hear this, as they always have blamed the recreational community for overfishing everything and taking away their livelihoods. NOAA and the various commissions and councils were happy to just accept these new numbers, and re-adjusted not only their quotas, but also the estimates of the stock sizes themselves. The logic was, well if we had been taking so many fish, the stocks must have been so much larger as well. But, what if MRIP's new methods are biased towards overestimating fishing effort? This would result in significant mistakes in the estimates for recreational harvest, and possibly premature adjustments to SSB. I fear that they improved the precision of the numbers, but not the accuracy. Just like a digital scale that reads a precise 4.68 lbs but could still be seriously in error. I'm starting to ask around amongst my contacts in the academic and regulatory camps just how much confidence there is in the "new" MRIP. Standby.

SHALLOW WATER WARNING - By now, most boaters are aware of the marked shallow water at the junction of High Bar channel and Double Creek. Two weeks ago when returning from the reef, I followed my usual tracks and got into some real shallow water - and this was only one hour into the outgoing tide. When I mentioned this to Andy Tonnesen, owner of Tony's B&T, he said to stay just to the outside of the red buoy when near the white caution buoy. A follow up trip through the area proved Andy was correct.

Resources, there is a link called Wave Height at Bell Buoy 2 Miles Outside Barnegat Inlet that takes you to NDBC - Station 44091 Recent Data (noaa.gov). This is a wonderful site that gives you wave heights, wave period, wave direction and water temperature every 30 minutes plus 24 hrs of past readings. It is a great resource to use for real time data rather than a forecast for our general area. On a recent trip fishing near the buoy, I noticed the water was 40+ feet deep. However, the buoy site lists the water depth at 25.6 m which is ~85 feet. Digging a bit deeper, I realized that the referenced buoy (#44091) is actually located 15 nm East of Barnegat Inlet. It was established in 2014 and is the closest buoy to the Jersey shore providing this type of data. I just wanted to clarify my previous information. It is still a great resource that everyone should use before venturing out into the ocean. The *Links* name has been changed to reflect the correct location.

CAST NET VIDEO by Ed Valitutto - Also on our *LINKS* pulldown menu under **Resources**, there is a link for How to Throw a Cast Net that takes you to How to Throw a Cast Net Video - YouTube This is the best site I have found for learning how to use a net. Yes, I know the young lady is very attractive, but eventually you will focus on the tutorial. Peanut bunker are now present in my lagoon and my grandson has been catching them. They are a great free bait for fluking, weakfish, etc. You can also use the net in the surf when mullet make their run south.

BEACH HAVEN CHARTER FISHING ASSOCIATION REEF UPDATE FROM CAPT LEWIS - As you may recall, I reported that VHFC made a \$500 donation to the reef project that recently deposited several vessels on LER. VHFC made a second \$500 donation for a follow-on reef effort getting underway. In response to my request for a status update, Captain Lewis sent me the following email on 20 July.

Currently, we are looking at reef balls rather for reef use. They are readily available and better for fluke fishing vs the ships that are better suited for seabass and tog.

There is a company in Sarasota, Fl. that makes them \$250 per 1300 lb ball and can ship 30 of them here for around \$10,000 total. Then we need to deploy them. There is a State boat that may be available at no cost but limited schedule depending on the other needs. We are also seeking prices from a private vendor to deploy them and I will update you when we nail that down.

The other option and the one that the DEP and the Sport Fishing Fund are proposing is that we make them with volunteer labor. The DEP has 20 molds available. I am trying to find out more of the details such as what land and equipment do they have available to prep, pour and cure the balls and store them until the state boat is available. I was told we can make them for \$90 each. I am exploring this option but I believe we would need three days of volunteers to make each set of 20. It may be cheaper but getting the necessary volunteers for an ongoing project will be difficult.

Captain Lewis then sent out the following email on 3 August...

All of a sudden things are moving in the reef world. The state boat that would deploy reef balls is available in August and September and January and February. I found this out over the weekend.

It may be possible to make balls in time for September deployment but it is questionable as there are a lot of unanswered questions as of today as well as supplies to procure.

I am working to get volunteers for the end of August but in consultation with the DEP we think it would be good to buy the existing 30 reef balls which could be shipped to NJ in about two weeks and deploy them from the State boat at no cost. The pre-made balls will cost about \$11,000 including delivery to the boat in Forked River. The contractor we talked with to deploy them wants \$36,000 so the free boat looks very good right now.

To make them ourselves we need to procure 16 4X8' 3/4 sheets of pressure treated plywood, 32 4X4X8' lumber, and two loads of concrete and probably some other consumables and reusable parts. I should know more within the week. If this works out we could deploy around 100 plus balls per year or more to the four reefs off of LBI, The most underdeveloped reefs in New jersey.

As a reminder the average reef in NJ has over 600,000 cubic Yards of material on them. Garden State North has around 50,000 cu. yds. Garden State South has 12,000 cu. yds. Barnegat Inlet has 10,000 cu. yds. and Little Egg had 11,000 cu. yds. after our January deployment.

All of you have been very generous to make the first deployment a reality. We hope you will continue to support the Beach Haven Charter Fishing's Junior Mate Reef project. www.bhcfa.org is an IRS approved 501c3 nonprofit so your investment in the future of fishing off of LBI should be tax deductible.

SOUTHERN VISITOR - During the last week of July, Bill Figley was fishing Barnegat Ridge and caught the impressive 33" Kingfish shown below. Not to be confused with members of the Drum family normally caught in the surf with the same name, Kingfish are actually King Mackerel and are aggressive fish with amazing teeth.







That's Cheri Hebert with a nice pair of triggerfish caught early July in the bay. Cheri says he gets them under rafts of eelgrass. Eelgrass is loaded with crabs and shrimp that the triggers feed on. He gets his boat even with the floating vegetation and drifts along with it while dropping small baited hooks.

NEW USE FOR CHAMOIS by Ed Valitutto - Remember those slimy feeling 'cloths' you used to wash your car. Well those were chamois usually pronounced 'shammy' but properly pronounced 'shamwa' in french. Chamois leather was traditionally the skin of a European mountain goat but today made almost exclusively from a sheepskin. So how does this relate to fishing? Well, I read an article in *On The Water* a few years back about using chamois as a substitute for Uncle Josh's Pork Rind which was no longer being manufactured - see https://www.onthewater.com/the-anglers-work-bench-make-your-own-chamois-trailers Then at the fluke picnic Cheri Hebert mentioned it and I decided to try it for myself.

Now the article recommends using artificial chamois that can be bought at most auto or big box stores. Mine cost around \$18 and was called the Absorber from NAPA. The article recommended cutting the strips 5" X ½". I cut some that length but then cut most of them 1" X 8 ½". Since the cloth was 17" X 28", I ended up with 56 strips. If you cut them ½" wide, you'll get 112 strips. When my wife asked what I was doing with the ruler, pen, razor knife and board, I told her and she commented, "You need to get a life". Wives - what do they know!

The strips definitely catch fish. I even drew eyes on some. You can use them as is or dye them or dip them in shedder or bunker oil or even Gulp liquid. Best of all, you leave them on your hook and they revive when put back in water. You also won't get into trouble with NJ F&G! I'll bring them to Friday's meeting and you can have a sample or two to try for yourself.





That's my pile of strips on the left and single 1" and $\frac{1}{2}$ " strips with 'eyes' on the right. I wouldn't throw away your Gulp or sell your stock just yet. In our limited trials, blowfish didn't destroy them and fluke hit them. Maybe my wife was right?

RECIPE SUBMITTED BY BILL DABNEY - Maple Glazed Salmon

1 (1 1/2-pound) skin-on or skinless salmon fillet in one piece

12 fresh cilantro sprigs

2 tablespoons pure maple syrup

2 tablespoons whole-grain Dijon mustard

1 tablespoon mayonnaise


Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper

Lemon wedges, for serving

- 1. Remove salmon from the refrigerator 30 minutes before cooking. Heat oven to 400.
- 2. Bundle the cilantro sprigs by their stems and hold them tightly, then slice the stems crosswise until you get to the leaves. Reserve leaves for garnish. Transfer sliced stems to a small bowl and stir in the maple syrup, mustard and mayonnaise until well mixed.
- 3. Season the salmon all over with salt and pepper and place in a baking dish, skin-side down if there is skin. Slather the maple sauce all over the top.
- 4. Bake until a paring knife slides into the center with only a little resistance or meat thermometer reads 130 F, 20 to 24 minutes. When you remove the knife and touch the blade to your upper lip, it should feel very warm but not hot. The salmon will continue to heat through out of the oven in the baking dish. Top with the reserved cilantro leaves, and squeeze lemon wedges all over just before serving. Enjoy!

BoatUS / BOATING SAFETY by Jeff Orsoe - VESSEL SAFETY CHECKS - No cost, no penalty vessel safety checks (VSC) at launch ramps, boat clubs and marinas are back. Contact your local U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary or U.S. Power Squadrons to see if there is a VSC event scheduled at a marina, boat club or launch ramp. VHFC Jeff Orsoe can also perform the VSC.
