NEW JERSEY SALTWATER RECREATIONAL REGISTRY - Individual saltwater anglers ages 16 and older MUST register with the State of New Jersey. Registrations expire on 31 December. So if you are now age 16+ or you have not yet renewed your registration for 2022, go to NJ Saltwater Registry and complete the appropriate form. Registration is free and is required if you fish NJ waters. Also, your registration number is needed if you plan to apply for a striped bass Bonus Tag.

VHFC MEMBER DIRECTORY - After receiving several requests for a club directory and now more importantly having a volunteer (Rosemary Figley) to generate the list, VHFC will generate a directory of members' names with their address, phone, email and boat name. NEW JERSEY JCAA & FISHING REGULATIONS by Phil Simon -

<u>JCAA News:</u> The annual JCAA Fluke Tournament will be held on Saturday June 11, with the awards ceremony scheduled for June 17 at the Resorts Hotel and Casino in Atlantic City. As usual, the tournament will be organized into multiple "ports", allowing for fishing against competitors in your local waters. There is a \$50K overall prize for the largest Fluke exceeding 12lbs, as well as optional calcuttas for fluke and seabass. The entry fee is \$150 per boat up to 6 anglers, plus any of the calcuttas that you select. Updated info on the JCAA website should be posted soon (currently it shows info for last year).

Regulatory News: We are still awaiting (as of April 2) final determination of the 2022 bag and size limits for most of the species we commonly fish. Striped Bass opened in March with the same limits as last year - one fish from 28 inches to less than 38 inches and circle hooks required when fishing natural bait. We can probably expect a 13 inch minimum on black sea bass this year but stand by, and we are not expecting any significant change in the bag and size limits for summer flounder, although the season may be extended a few days. For the rest, we need to await the posting by the NJ DEP.

Editorial by Phil SImon: The Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission (ASMFC, 0-3 miles, state waters) and the Mid Atlantic Marine Fisheries Council (MAMFC, 3 – 250 miles, Federal zone), who jointly manage Scup, Summer Flounder, Black Sea Bass, and Bluefish, are seeking public input on draft addenda to the fishery management plans for those species. This set of proposals are part of the output of the Recreational Reform Initiative which has been implemented to come up with hopefully better approaches to setting harvest limits for the recreational sector. This particular set of proposals deals with the methods used to determine whether to increase, decrease, and leave unchanged the overall recreational sector harvest limits in terms of number or pounds of fish to be kept each year.

The current method estimates the projected harvest based on the Marine Recreational Information Program (MRIP) data from the previous year, primarily the harvest number, and then determine if the next year's harvest should be decreased, increased, or remain unchanged based on whether the Recreational Harvest Limit (RHL) was exceeded or not, and set the new RHL accordingly. For species such as Black Sea Bass and Scup, whose stock numbers are quite good, this creates a problem in that with lots of fish available, we catch more fish and go over our RHL, and so the regulations are tightened for the following year. What we need here is an approach that allows a little more liberalization for species with healthy stocks. Thus the need for some new thinking here, and the regulatory committees have developed four new options plus the option for maintaining the status quo for calculating future RHLs. But there is a puzzling aspect to this! For some reason, a number of the recreational fishing organizations, including both RFA and JCAA, have selected Option B, the so-called Percent Change Approach. as the one they favor. However, in my opinion, this option does not fix the problem relative to the status quo. Without going into details, here is a table that I prepared that shows what the regulatory committee projects as the outcomes for each of the five options A-E for three of the four species (bluefish is omitted because it it currently in a rebuilding program):

Take a look at the full document and see if you would agree with my table, but I have to question the choice of option B, as it decreases summer flounder and provides us no relief for scup or black sea bass. Options C – E look better, but most of the details are not provided in the public information document. Personally, I would let the committee work on this some more and narrow it down to no more than 3 options.

But, if I had to pick a new approach now, I would go with Option E, as it focuses primarily on the size of the stock, and less on MRIP data, and other factors such as recruitment. The MRIP numbers, including estimated catch and fishing mortality are highly problematic in my opinion in terms of their accuracy, although are useful in following trends over a period of years. Recruitment, while predicting future possible stock size increases or decreases, is not really correlated with fishing pressure until the stock is so low that it can be described as "crashed".

I suspect that the fishery folks would not be happy with my assessment, and I have over-simplified the approaches for sure. I give them a lot of credit for rescuing many of the fish stocks that were depleted. But they have not done a good job with regulating stocks that are healthy, at least up to now, and we see in this draft addendum an attempt to make things better (except for option B).

The ultimate problem we are facing is that poor recruitment primarily due to environmental conditions is reducing the size of the stocks, and this has very little to do with overfishing. As the regulators really can do nothing about recruitment, they are left to twist the dials on recreational and commercial harvest levels which are already at historically low levels.

In the end it's the size of the stock that counts, so why not focus primarily on that. Just keep in mind that this decision could impact our bag limits, size limits, and seasons starting in 2023. As they say, *you get what you pay for*.

MONTHLY RECIPE SUBMITTED by Bill Dabney - *World's Best Bluefish Recipe* This recipe recently appeared in *On The Water* magazine. While it is intended for Bluefish, I think Striped Bass would also work very well. If anyone tries the recipe, please provide comments. **Ingredients:**

- 2 bluefish filets ~1 lb each
- 1 1/2 lbs boiling potatoes
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 2 tablespoons chopped garlic
- 1/4 cup chopped parsley

Directions:

- 1) Preheat the oven to 450 degrees. Slice the potatoes thinly (1/8 inch thick) and mix with half the olive oil. parsley and garlic. Line a casserole dish, bottom and sides, with the mixture. Salt and pepper to taste. Bake for 15 minutes.
- 2) Remove from the oven and place the filets on top of the potatoes. Salt and pepper the fish and place the remaining oil, parsley and garlic on top.
- 3) Return the pan to the oven and bake for 10 minutes. Baste with pan juices and bake 5 minutes more.
- 4) Garnish with additional parsley and lemon wedges.

BoatUS SPRING COMMISSIONING CHECKLIST - Submitted by Jeff Orsoe - Have a trouble-free boating season. Boat Owners Association of The United States (BoatUS) offers its Spring Commissioning Checklist to help boaters start the season right. The nation's largest advocacy, service and savings group also offers BoatUS.com/Spring, a one-stop-shop for everything you need to know about the yearly ritual of recreational boat commissioning. A PDF copy of the checklist is available to download, print, and take to the boat with you. Be sure to follow all manufacturer recommendations for your specific boat, engine and accessories.

Before You Launch

- Inspect all around the hose clamps for rust and replace as necessary. Double clamp
 fuel lines and exhaust hoses with marine-rated stainless steel hose clamps. While not
 technically required, it's wise to double clamp whenever possible on all hoses —
 especially those below the waterline.
- 2. Inspect all hoses for stiffness, rot, leaks and cracking, and replace any that are faulty. Make sure they fit snugly.
- 3. Inspect prop(s) for dings, pitting and distortion. Make sure cotter pins are secure.
- 4. Grip the prop (on inboard drive systems) and try moving the shaft up and down and side to side. If it's loose and can be wiggled, the cutless bearing may need to be replaced.
- 5. Check the rudderstock to ensure it hasn't been bent. Operate the wheel or tiller to ensure the steering works correctly. Check the rudder bearing and steering cable for unusual play or movement.
- 6. Inspect the hull for blisters, distortions and stress cracks.
- 7. Make sure your engine intake sea strainer (if equipped) is not cracked or bent from ice and is free of corrosion, clean and properly secured.
- 8. With inboards, check the engine shaft and rudder stuffing boxes for correct adjustment. A stuffing box should leak no more than two or three drops each minute

- when the prop shaft is turning. Check the shaft log hose for deterioration and rusty hose clamps.
- 9. Inspect, lubricate and exercise thru-hull valves. It's a good idea to tie a right-sized wooden bung to the valve in case of failure.
- 10. Use a garden hose to check for deck leaks at ports and hatches. Renew caulk or gaskets as necessary.
- 11. Inspect and test the bilge pump and float switch to ensure they're both working properly. Also inspect the pump's hose.
- 12. Check stove and remote LPG tanks for loose fittings, leaking hoses and properly functioning shutoff systems. Use the pressure gauge to conduct a leak down test to check for system leaks.
- 13. Inspect dock and anchor lines for chafe and wear.
- 14. If equipped, ensure that the stern drain plug is installed.
- 15. After the boat is launched, be sure to check all thru-hulls for leaks.

Engines and Fuel Systems

- 1. Inspect fuel lines, including fuel tank fill and vent hoses, for softness, brittleness or cracking. Check all joints for leaks, and make sure all lines are well supported with noncombustible clips or straps with smooth edges.
- 2. Inspect fuel tanks, fuel pumps and filters for leaks. Ensure portable tanks and lines are completely drained of stale fuel before filling with fresh fuel. Clean or replace fuel filters and/or fuel-water separators if not done before winterization.
- 3. Every few years, remove and inspect exhaust manifolds and risers for corrosion (for inboard-powered and inboard/outboard boats).
- 4. Charge battery.
- 5. Clean and tighten electrical connections, especially both ends of battery cables. Use a wire brush to clean battery terminals, and top off cells with distilled water (if applicable).
- 6. Inspect the bilge ventilation intake and blower ducting for damage or leaks and run the blower to confirm correct operation.
- 7. Test engine warnings and alarms.

Engine Outdrives and Outboards

- 1. Inspect rubber outdrive bellows for cracked, dried and/or deteriorated spots (look especially in the folds) and replace if suspect.
- 2. Check power steering and power trim oil levels.
- 3. Replace anodes/zincs that are more than half wasted.
- 4. Inspect the outer jacket of control cables. Cracks or swelling indicate corrosion and mean that the cable must be replaced.

5. Inspect lower unit oil level and top off as necessary.

Sailboat Rigging

- Inspect swage fittings for cracks and heavy rust (some discoloration is acceptable).
 Inspect wire halyards and running backstays for "fishhooks" and rust.
- 2. Remove tape on turnbuckles and lubricate threads, preferably with Teflon. Replace old tape with fresh tape, and ensure that water is able to freely drain from it.
- 3. If you suspect the core around a chainplate is damp, remove the chainplate to inspect and make repairs.
- 4. Inspect masthead sheaves and all blocks to make sure they're running freely.

Trailers

- 1. Inspect tire treads and sidewalls for cracks or lack of tread and replace as necessary. Check air pressure; don't forget the spare.
- 2. Inspect wheel bearings and repack as necessary.
- 3. Test all lights and replace any broken bulbs or lenses.
- 4. Inspect winch to make sure it's working properly. Inspect hitch chains.
- 5. Inspect trailer frame and axle(s) for rust. Sand and paint to prevent further deterioration.
- Inspect brakes and brake fluid reservoir.

Safety

- 1. A <u>new law that went into effect in 2021</u> requires a vessel operator to use either a helm or outboard lanyard or wireless engine cutoff switch on certain vessels less than 26 feet when traveling on plane or above displacement speed, so be sure your switch is working properly and the lanyard is in serviceable condition. If you use a wireless cutoff switch, ensure batteries in the fobs and wrist worn devices are refreshed.
- 2. Flares expire after 42 months so check expiration dates.
- 3. Inspect fire extinguishers. A <u>new regulation that goes into effect April 20</u>, 2022, requires a 12-year expiration for disposables and has different carriage requirements for older and newer model year vessels.
- 4. Ensure you have properly sized and wearable life jackets in good condition for each passenger, including kids. Check inflatable life jacket cylinders and dissolvable "pill" bobbins in auto-inflating models.
- 5. Test smoke, carbon monoxide, fume and bilge alarms.
- 6. Check running lights for operation and spare bulb inventory.
- 7 Update chartplotter software.
- 8. Replenish first-aid kit items that may have been used last season or are expired.

- Check the operation of VHF radio(s) and that the MMSI number is correctly programmed in. (<u>BoatUS members can obtain a free MMSI number at</u> <u>BoatUS.com/MMSI</u>.)
- Get a free vessel safety check from the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary or U.S. Power Squadrons. Find out more at <u>cgaux.org/vsc</u>.

For the Dock

- In addition to checking its entire length for wear or abrasions, check both ends of the shore power cable connections as well as the shore power receptacle on the boat for burns, which indicate the cable and/or boat's shore power inlet or the dock's receptacle must be replaced.
- 2. Test ground-fault protection on your boat and private dock, and know how to prevent Electric Shock Drowning.

The Paperwork

- 1. Make sure your boat registration is up to date and dinghy if you have one. Don't forget your boat trailer tags
- 2. Review your boat insurance policy and update coverage if needed. BoatUS provides <u>free quotes at BoatUS.com/Insurance</u>. Provide a copy to your marina or club.
- 3. Ensure your BoatUS membership is in good standing, and check your <u>TowBoatUS</u> coverage by logging into <u>BoatUS.com/Account</u>, or join at <u>BoatUS.com/Membership</u>.
- 4. Download the free BoatUS App (<u>BoatUS.com/App</u>) to make it easy to summon on-water assistance and speed response times as well to check tide tables, weather, and partner discounts.



VESSEL SAFETY CHECKS - By Jeff Orsoe Both the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary and the United States Power Squadrons have certified vessel examiners who will perform a free Vessel Safety Check ("VSC") at your boat, at a time of mutual convenience. There is no charge and no consequences if your boat doesn't pass. Our goal is simply to help make boating as safe as possible for you, your family and your friends. Personal pleasure craft, only.

I am available to perform a Vessel Safety exam on your vessel. As stated above, there is no charge for the exam and if you do not qualify for the sticker, the results will not be reported to any agency. Contact: Jeff Orsoe Cell / Text: 732-672-5530 or email: jorsoe786@gmail.com

A fire extinguisher is one of the items that is required. This year a new law regarding them is in effect. The extinguisher now has a 12 year qualifying life cycle. If you look at the bottom, you will see the year it was made. Just add 12 years to that date to figure the expiration date.

There were only two reports submitted since the December Newsletter and yours truly was the author of both.



While down in Cape Coral, FL for the winter months, I went fishing off a small park pier using a shrimp on a small hook on the bottom. My first ever redfish inhaled the shrimp and gave me quite a battle. I estimated the fish was 30"and at least 10+ lbs. Florida normally has a one fish limit from 18' to 27", so this fish likely to would not have been legal. However, redfish and snook are 'catch and release' due to the red tide a few years back. So, after a quick photo, back it went!





I went out on a solo charter for a half day back bay fishing. We started casting for snook and I boated the one shown. Snook are catch and release so it was quickly released and sent on its way. I had two more on – one was a beast – but they both threw the hook!

We then fished for speckled trout. We caught them on both pilchards and shrimp under a popping cork. One was 15", one 17" and one 19+" We also looked to no avail for stingrays with cobia swimming over them. We saw a few rays but all were without cobia. There's always next year!
