NEW JERSEY JCAA & FISHING REGULATIONS - Editor's Note: Since JCAA is off for the summer, Phil Simon has submitted an Opinion Piece on our Fishing Regulations. This is Phil's opinion and does not reflect the official position of VHFC. I personally agree with Phil. Read it and we can discuss it at our meeting next Friday.

OPINION by Phil Simon - Have you been wondering why our fishing regulations seem to have gotten even worse in recent years despite the fact that our landings of fish are at historical lows? One of the reasons may be that the regulators are looking at bad data. Some years ago, everyone was complaining about the "fatally flawed data" that was being used as input for the calculations and models used by the fisheries scientists to calculate stock sizes, catch limits, season openings and closings and the rest of the numbers we are presented with each year by the NJ Marine Fisheries Council. The council is obligated by law to set their regulations based on the hard numbers of allowable catch by weight presented to them by NOAA and their scientists (known as the Science and Statistics Committee, SSC).

In acknowledgement to the reviews that their methods were bad, NOAA instituted a new effort to come up with a "better" way of estimating the catch and fishing effort numbers that are the major pieces of data that determine our yearly numbers. This new set of methods, collectively termed the Marine Recreational Information Program (MRIP) made several changes, the most significant being the way that fishing effort was surveyed. In the past this was done by a random telephone survey of all NJ residents (with landline phones), but the new method

surveyed known fisherman by mail (based on a variety of lists including, in our case, the NJ Saltwater Registry), hoping to get better precision and accuracy of the number of people out there fishing. Catch estimates (the number of fish caught per trip) were also changed somewhat. These are based on the dock intercepts, where fisheries personnel question returning recreational fisherman what species they fished for and how many fish they caught.

MRIP replaced the old system during the 2018 – 2020 fishing seasons. What was reported was that the number of people and trips out in the recreational catch that made up the fishing effort had been grossly underestimated, sometimes as much as eight-fold, depending on the fishery. This forced the regulatory agencies (the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission, and the Mid Atlantic Marine Fisheries Council) to tighten the regs to limit the recreational catch even more, which is why things have seemed to have gotten worse for us. And because it seemed we were catching so many more fish, the SSC decided that the stock sizes for many of our targeted species needed upward revisions as well. Otherwise, it was reasoned, we would have fished out the stocks long ago. The beneficiaries of these enlarged stock estimates turned out to be the commercial sector, whose quotas were increased. Because we had been catching more fish than we were “supposed to” our quotas were not increased. This is a highly questionable set of logic from a statistical standpoint, as we are using new, yet unconfirmed estimates of fishing effort to re-set what should be determined by both fishery dependent and fishery independent measures, including actual trawl surveys that count the fish. Alarm bells should have been ringing so that before making these changes to the state of the world, perhaps some further examination of the new methods and data be conducted.

The MRIP people of course could find nothing wrong with what they had created. But think about this for a minute. By focusing their new survey on people who are known fishermen, they omitted all the people who are only occasional players, and in effect made the sample less random, and, perhaps, less representative of the people out there fishing. Think about the people you see out on the reefs on the average weekend. Do you think they are all fishing enthusiasts like our club members with years of experience? What percent of the typical recreational fleet out on the Barnegat Light Reef really know what they are doing? There’s an old saying that *10% of the fishermen catch 90% of the fish*. I suspect there is a fair amount of truth in this, but do you think the SSC takes this into account, correctly, when computing their fishing effort numbers? I have been told that well, of course they do. But could they be off a bit on their catch estimates? Perhaps more than a bit? What do you think?

Statisticians call this a skewed sample, meaning it is biased, in this case assuming that the MRIP sample population of known fishermen is the same as the total recreational fishing community, when it may not be. This assumption, and the overall methodology, needs to be more thoroughly examined. A better method of estimating fishing effort may correct the nonsense we have been hearing in the last few years. So, the moral of this story is: *Beware of*

what you wish for. We forced NOAA into “doing something”, and we got MRIP. In my opinion, we may have replaced one set of bad data with another.

REVISED HISTORY OF NJ FISHING REGULATIONS by Ed Valitutto - I did an article in the [Sept 2021 Newsletter](#), detailing the history of our Regulations. I updated the Summary Table below for 2023 and it is a perfect segue to Phil's piece. **Warning:** It is pretty depressing to see how much our fishing regulations have changed for the worse - shorter seasons, lower bag limits and increased size / maximum size requirements - over the last 20 years. Don't blame this on global warming or the wind turbines - they may very well cause future issues. Blame it on taking years to invoke a 200 mile limit No Fish Zone, continued industrial pollution / fertilizer runoff especially in the striper estuaries, continued Menhaden overfishing and lack of Fish & Game enforcement personnel for starters! Bad data just exacerbates the problem!

FISH CLEANING ARTICLE (Source Unknown) submitted by Bill Dabney - Many people will never truly appreciate what great table fare fish can be for one simple reason - they've never eaten fish that has been well cared for. Most 'fresh' fish in markets probably sat on deck baking in the sun before making it below decks, where it was then 'flash' frozen. That was weeks before it ever made it to the store for purchase. That's why most people comment on the 'fishy taste' that turns them off. However, let them enjoy a piece of truly fresh and well cared for fish and their minds will be opened.

First, you need to properly care for your catch as soon as it hits the deck. Due to boat space, most people have coolers that are small and worse, do not have adequate ice. A better solution is to create a cold salt water brine. In a larger cooler, add a block or two of ice and enough saltwater to cover the fish. This is much better than dumping a few cubes of ice which melts too quickly.

When cleaning fish, two rules are keep the filets cool and keep them moist but not soaked. Fish well cared for on the boat can be ruined on the cleaning table. Do not leave your hard earned catch in the sun or have them soaking in water although a quick rinse (preferably in clean saltwater) to get off the majority of blood and scales is okay.

Once home, cut off any bones and trim off the dark meat. Give them a quick rinse, lay them out on paper towels and gently pat dry. If you plan on freezing them, let them sit for 10 - 20 minutes. This is very important as it prevents freezer burn. Bag the fish in meal size quality freezer bags without overcrowding and compressing the filets. Squeeze out any air in the bag and lay out the bags in your freezer.

Some folks swear by filling the bags with water to eliminate any air. By far, the best method is using a vacuum bagger to preserve your catch. After spending hundreds of dollars on rods, reels, bait and fuel (not to mention the cost of your boat or charter), spending \$99 on a vacuum sealer is a no brainer. Properly dried and sealed, your catch will keep for over 6 months and taste almost as good as the day you caught it!

FOLLOW UP by Ed Valitutto - I did an article in the July 2022 Newsletter [Properly Handle Your Catch](#), which supplements this very nicely and emphasizes the need to properly bleed your catch. I had always bled stripers and bluefish. But last year on a trip to Nantucket, every fluke and seabass on two different charters were immediately bled before going on ice.



Of course, I don't always follow my own advice. This photo taken a few weeks ago, shows a bled (R) and not bled (L) fluke. If these had been a striper or bluefish, the results would have been way more visual. Does it affect the taste - that's a separate test - but I believe it does.

MONTHLY RECIPE - Pan - Fried Fluke with Sweet Fish Sauce submitted by Bill Dabney - This recipe originated with John Geiser, the Asbury Park Press freelance outdoors columnist,

and can be found in his book "The Shore Catch". It is a nice change from the standard flour, egg wash and breadcrumbs.

Pan - Fried Fluke

Ingredients

- 2 Lbs Fluke filets or any white fish
- 1/3 cup cornmeal
- 1/3 cup flour
- 1/2 Tsp salt
- 1/2 Tsp paprika
- Oil for frying

Directions

- 1) Cut fish into serving size portions. Combine cornmeal, flour, salt & paprika and dredge filets in the mixture. Place in the refrigerator for ~15 minutes to set the coating.
- 2) Add oil to a fry pan (~1/8" depth) and heat until hot but not smoking ~360 degrees.
- 3) Add filets to the pan and fry for 3 - 5 minutes per side depending on thickness until golden brown. Turn the fish over and cook the other side. Drain on a wire rack and place in a warm (175 - 200 degree) oven to keep warm.
- 4) Wipe out the pan and add more oil. Heat as before and fry the remaining pieces.
- 5) Serve with lemon wedges or Sweet Fish Sauce

Sweet Fish Sauce

Ingredients

- 1/4 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing
- 2 TBS Sweet relish well drained
- 1 Tsp finely minced onion
- 1 Tsp lemon juice

Directions

Combine ingredients and mix well. Chill in the refrigerator for 30 minutes before serving.

Ed V's Comments: Drain the relish well and go easy with the lemon juice or the sauce will be watery. I also add a few drops of Sriracha or other hot sauce to color it light pink and provide just a hint of heat.
