# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Hello VHFC Members,

Wow, finally the winds and rains have abated! That was a tough period to go through with very limited opportunity to go out fishing. The number of FOM entries and Reports are very low this month indicative of the lack of fishing due to the weather. And yes, it was a sad end to the fluke season which closed on September 27th. Oh well, that's September but at least we have been fortunate to avoid any direct hurricane impact - at least so far. But remember, the Atlantic hurricane season officially runs from June 1 to November 30 so it is far from over.

October 1st welcomed the opening of seabass with some good fishing as the waves settled down. *On The Water* reported for our area "Great sea bassing over the past week as the weather and sea conditions finally cooperated for anglers with most boats reporting solid limits of fish along with some porgy and triggerfish. The yellowfin tuna bite regained some of the steam that occurred prior to the week long NE winds. The canyons are living up to the red hot month of October with solid yellowfin and mahi. Bluefin tuna have also been around the 10 to 15 mile

range off of Island Beach State Park. Surf fishing was slower, but the water began to clean up later this week and catches of out-of-season fluke, bluefish, and some striped bass were reported."

Just a reminder, the Seabass limit is 10 fish at 12.5 inches from October 1 - 31 and then increases to 15 fish at 12.5 inches from November 1 through December 31. Tog remains at 1 fish until November 15 then increases to 5 fish November 16 through the end of the year.

This is also the season that surf fishing comes into play. Migrating stripers can make an appearance at any time and offer great fishing opportunities along with bluefish for those days when the waves & winds make boating difficult or you just want to spend a few hours on the beach, The LBI Surf Fishing Tournament opened on Saturday October 7th and full details are provided later in the Newsletter.

Starting tomorrow, there are only 84 days until we'll all be singing that famous Scottish poem set to music, *Auld Lang Syne*! So make the most of the remaining days of autumn and enjoy the great outdoors. Once again, I look forward to seeing everyone at our next meeting.

Lastly, be sure to take a photo of your catch for our FOM / FOY awards and submit a report of your success for others to enjoy.

**OCTOBER MEETING - Our guest speaker is Jim Hutchinson Sr.** Jim is a renowned local fisherman who knows Barnegat Bay and our ocean area very well after living here and fishing for many years. Jim has written many fishing articles for various magazines and newspaper publications. Jim's topic is "Crabbing our local waters".

MANDATORY WINTER PFD WEAR - New Regulation 13:82-1.4(f) - Starting this November, no owner or operator of a recreational vessel less than 26 feet, including rowboats, canoes, kayaks, and stand-up paddleboards shall permit its operation between November 1st and May 1st, unless each person on board such vessel is wearing a securely fastened United States Coast Guard-approved wearable personal flotation device of an appropriate size while such vessel is underway. A person inside the cabin of a cabin vessel shall be exempt from this requirement.

In short, A USCG approved life jacket is required to be worn at all times, outside of a cabin on a boat under 26 feet during the cold-water months, while in motion, from 1 November to 1 May.

The goal of this legislative update is to prevent hypothermia deaths, and to decrease the risks placed upon first responders during winter search and rescue operations on the waters of New Jersey. In almost every instance of a vessel related drowning, the victim was not wearing a life vest.

New Jersey's coastal features are unique in regard to our offshore fishing, inlets, and tidal bays which result in a greater average recreational vessel size when compared to inland states with similar PFD regulations. This new regulation is in the best interest of the safety of operators and passengers on all New Jersey's waterways.

NEW JERSEY JCAA & FISHING REGULATIONS by Phil Simon - Lately there has been an uptick in the rhetoric surrounding the soon to be constructed wind turbine farms that will be situated along the NJ coast. A lot of it is a re-telling of old arguments about what the impact of the construction and placement of the wind turbines will have on marine life, including marine mammals and fish. Stories of how the current survey efforts by the turbine manufacturers are causing deaths to whales, presumably by sonar devices or other survey methods utilizing sound that disrupts the navigation of the mammals causing them to beach. Unfortunately, these stories almost always come from people and organizations who had already staked out their positions firmly against the turbine farms, and so far, there is really no data to support their claims. Also, there is not much independent data to remove the possibility that the survey methods are in fact having a detrimental effect, and the counterclaims usually come from those with a stake in seeing the projects continue. So, we are left to make our own judgments without really having any facts in hand. It should be noted however that when recent dead whales were examined by scientists, more than half were found to have succumbed to ship strikes or net entanglements, while many of the remaining dead whales were too decomposed to make a cause of death determination. So the issue remains unsettled!

One piece of pro-turbine propaganda that I see often is that the 330 turbines will attract sea life and thus provide us with new fishing opportunities. Indeed, this has been the case with the turbines off Block Island, but then that is a small farm of less than half a dozen sites. To "stock" 330 new sites off NJ would require an enormous uptick in recruitment of fish to the stocks of summer flounder, black sea bass, bluefish, and others. Where are these new fish coming from? Overall recruitment among the various species has been in crisis mode now for several years, due to a number of causes including climate change. More fish would have to come from more fry surviving to maturity. Unless our coastal estuaries show a sudden improvement, and climate change somehow disappears, these numbers will not increase. You should take with a grain of

salt any predictions of new fishing opportunities created by the wind turbines. Let's see what happens.

As best as I can tell, the NJ turbine projects are continuing full steam ahead, with reports of construction equipment being assembled on the coast already seen in local publications. The first turbines could come online as early as 2025. As best as can be told there are no contingency plans in place if there develops a significant negative impact of the turbine sites to fish migrations or other possible events. It's a go/no stop plan. What could possibly go wrong?

The Mid-Atlantic Marine Fisheries Council just held its full meeting in NYC this past weekend, but a summary of what was decided has not yet been issued. The Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission will be holding its next meeting in mid-October. I hope to be able to summarize major decisions from both meetings in the next newsletter.

DOCKSIDE SCARE by Ed Valitutto - A week ago Friday after the rains finally subsided, I noticed my boat was sitting low in the bow. I have a SeaPro 239 with a 300 hp engine and bow mounted trolling motor. I have had water problems before and after several sealing attempts, I now use white duct tape to seal my front and rear deck hatches. The boat does not have scuppers and the only deck drainage is via a grating across the stern. Upon closer look, my deck at the bow had 5" of standing water that decreased to 0" at the console. But there was enough water to tilt the boat forward and prevent any from reaching the stern drain.

I lowered my motor to shift some weight aft and started the engine. It took about 20 minutes using a push broom to move the water to the drain. I then decided to open the bilge hatch blocked when the motor is up. To my shock, it was filled with water to the top. I then cut the duct tape and opened the rear hatch to my battery compartment. This was also filled to the top, completely submerging the batteries and fuses! I quickly called Causeway Marine and borrowed a sump pump.

Thirty minutes later, the water was drained and CM determined that my bilge was dead and replaced it. How my batteries still worked and how the rain water got below decks is a mystery. Bottom line - Be sure to verify that your bilge is functioning especially during prolonged rains!

**ANNUAL LBI SURF FISHING CLASSIC -** The 69th Annual Fall Surf Fishing Tournament is 9 weeks of fall fishing on Long Beach Island with over \$25,000 in prizes.

This tournament is exciting for all anglers with cash and other prizes awarded for five varieties of fish. Striped Bass lead the way with prizes also available for Bluefish, Kingfish, Tog and Red Drum. This year's tournament dates run from October 7 through December 10, 2023.

Once again, the Classic has daily, weekly, three three-week segments, and grand prizes for striped bass, kingfish, and bluefish. There are also prizes in each three-week segment for the largest tautog and red drum weighed in.

There are a pair of new prizes for 2023. There is a \$500 Grand Slam prize for the angler weighing in the most individual species. Four is the minimum number needed, and the total weight of the fish will break a tie. This year there will also be a Surf Master "Catch and Release" award. This will be awarded for the largest overall striped bass landed and released determined by total length. A picture of the fish is necessary before the bass is safely released.

Surf City Bait and Tackle in Surf City, Jingles Bait and Tackle in Beach Haven, and Fisherman's Headquarters in Ship Bottom are the official weigh-in sites. Registration and regulations are available at all three.



Register now for your commemorative LBI Surf Fishing Classic hat (available while supplies last). You will also receive a decal for your car, rules with a list of prizes and your own personal Derby Entry Badge. Entry fees are \$30 for adults, and \$15 for junior anglers ages seventeen and under. Full details at LBI Fall Classic. For all the latest daily weigh-ins and to see who has the largest fish to date, go to Live Weigh-In Results. There are already several weigh-ins for bass, tog and kingfish!

VHFC 2ND ANNUAL BOTTOM FISHING TRIP by Ed Valitutto - After weeks of strong winds and high seas, all was calm on October 3rd for our second annual bottom fishing trip on the *Super Chic*. Moored at the old *Carolyn Ann III* dock at VIking Village in Barnegat Light, everyone arrived on time for our 6:00 AM departure. Once outside the inlet, seas were calm and we knew we lucked out with a 'bluebird' day. Our first stop was 10 -12 miles due east and we were fishing by 7:30. Winds were so calm that anchoring was not feasible. Instead, Capt Ted let the boat drift with an occasional small adjustment using the engines.

Once our baits hit bottom, a ravenous hoard of sea bass and small bluefish attacked our baits. Unfortunately, there were a lot of small seabass despite early reports of many large fish before the season opened. The captain said this was due to all the turbulence the passing storms brought that made the bigger fish seek deeper water. Nonetheless, we still caught a lot of fish of several species including sea bass, 1 - 2 lb bluefish, nice sized triggerfish, several dinner plate porgies, out of season fluke, a half dozen bonita, line tangling chub mackerel and one large eel!

Due to all the throwbacks, we didn't get back until 2:40. It was a long, fun day with some fine filets brought home for the table.

**MONTHLY RECIPE HOT CRAB DIP - Originally submitted by Jim Hutchinson Sr -** Since Jim is our guest speaker next week, I thought his Hot Crab DIp recipe would be appropriate.

# Ingredients

- 1 Lb crab meat \*
- 1 cup mayonnaise
- 18 oz cream cheese
- 1 small onion minced
- 2 scallions minced
- 1 TBS lemon juice
- 1/2 TSP dried dill
- Few drops of hot sauce

#### **Directions**

- 1. Pick through the crabs to remove all shells.
- 2. Soften the cream cheese and blend with the mayo.

<sup>\*</sup> You can catch and clean your own crabs (Jim's choice), buy a can of crab meat for \$30-40 or my favorite, buy cooked Dungeness crab clusters at Costco for \$9.99/lb or ~\$20 / package. Picking the meat is simple and it's delicious. Just warm and dip in butter!

- 3. Add all other ingredients except crab and blend gently.
- 4. Fold in the crab and transfer to an ovenproof baking dish.
- 5. Bake in a preheated 350 oven for 30 minutes until bubbly and starting to turn brown on top.
- 6. Serve with your favorite crackers. Enjoy!

**VESSEL SAFETY CHECKS - By Jeff Orsoe** Both the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary and the United States Power Squadrons have certified vessel examiners who will perform a free Vessel Safety Check ("VSC") at your boat, at a time of mutual convenience. There is no charge and no consequences if your boat doesn't pass. Our goal is simply to help make boating as safe as possible for you, your family and your friends. Personal pleasure craft, only.

A fire extinguisher is one of the items that is required. Last year, a new law regarding them went into effect. The extinguisher now has a 12 year qualifying life cycle. If you look at the bottom, you will see the year it was made. Just add 12 years to that date to figure the expiration date.
